What does the fund invest in?

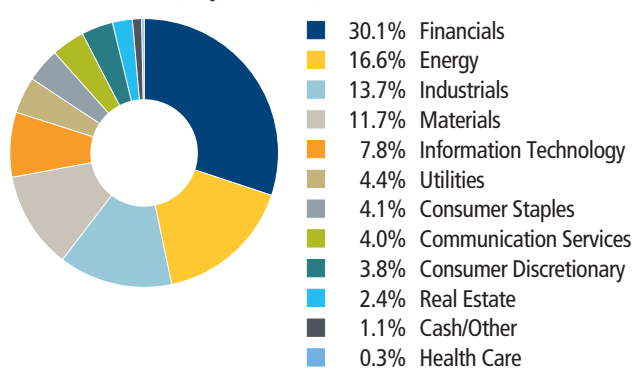
The fund invests primarily in equity securities in order to track the performance of the S&P/TSX Capped Composite Total Return Index*, indirectly by investing in units of the iShares Core S&P/TSX Capped Composite Index ETF which tracks the same index.

How risky is it?

The value of the fund can go down as well as up. You could lose money.

One way to gauge risk is to look at how much a fund's returns change over time. This is called "volatility".

In general, funds with higher volatility will have returns that change more over time. They typically have a greater chance of losing money and may have a greater chance of higher returns. Funds with lower volatility tend to have returns that change less over time. They typically have lower returns and may have a lower chance of losing money.

Risk rating

RBC GAM has rated the volatility of this fund as **medium**.

This rating is based on how much the fund's returns have changed from year to year. It doesn't tell you how volatile the fund will be in the future. The rating can change over time. A fund with a low risk rating can still lose money.

No guarantees

Like most mutual funds, this fund doesn't have any guarantees. You may not get back the amount of money you invest.

How has the fund performed?

This section tells you how Series A units of the fund have performed since the date they were created. Returns are after expenses have been deducted. These expenses reduce the fund's returns.

Year-by-year returns

This section tells you how Series A units of the fund have performed in past calendar years. However, this information is not available because the fund has not yet completed a calendar year.

Best and worst 3-month returns

This section shows the best and worst returns for Series A units of the fund in a 3-month period. However, this information is not available because the fund has not yet completed a calendar year.

Average return

A person who invested \$1,000 in Series A units of the fund since the date the fund was created would have \$962 as at May 31, 2023. This works out to an annual compound return of -2.8%.

Who is this fund for?

Investors who:

- are seeking long-term capital growth potential
- want to diversify their portfolio by investment management approach
- are prepared to fully participate in both market upturns and downturns, as the fund is generally fully invested
- are planning to hold their investment for the long term

A word about tax

In general, you'll have to include in your taxable income any money you make on a fund held outside a registered plan such as a Registered Retirement Savings Plan or a Tax-Free Savings Account. How much income tax you pay depends on the tax laws that apply to you and the fund.

Keep in mind that if you hold your fund in a non-registered account, fund distributions are included in your taxable income, whether you get them in cash or have them reinvested.

How much does it cost?

The following tables show the fees and expenses you could pay to buy, own and sell Series A units of the fund. The fees and expenses - including any commissions - can vary among series of a fund and among funds. Higher commissions can influence representatives to recommend one investment over another. Ask about other funds and investments that may be suitable for you at a lower cost.

1. Sales charges

Series A units are no load. That means you pay no sales charges if you buy, redeem or switch your units.

2. Fund expenses

You don't pay these expenses directly. They affect you because they reduce the fund's returns.

As of December 31, 2022, the expenses for Series A units of the fund were 1.32% of its value. This equals \$13.20 for every \$1,000 invested.

Annual rate (as a % of the Series A units' value)

Management expense ratio (MER)

This is the total of the fund's management fee (including the trailing commission) and operating expenses (the administration fee, other fund costs and taxes).

These are the fund's trading costs.

More about the trailing commission

The trailing commission is an ongoing commission. It is paid for as long as you own the fund. It is for the services and advice your representative and your representative's firm provide to you. Your representative's firm may pay part of the trailing commission to its representatives.

RBC GAM pays your representative's firm a trailing commission. The trailing commission is paid out of the management fee. The rate for this series of the fund is 1.00% of the value of your investment each year. This equals \$10.00 each year for every \$1,000 invested.

3. Other fees

You may have to pay other fees when you buy, hold, sell, switch or reclassify units of the fund.

Fee	What you pay
Short-term trading fee	2% of the value of units you sell or switch within 7 days of buying them. This fee goes to the fund.
Registered tax plan fee	Fees may be payable to your representative or to his or her firm if you transfer an investment within a registered plan to another financial institution. None of these fees are paid to us.



What if I change my mind?

Under securities law in some provinces and territories, you have the right to:

- withdraw from an agreement to buy mutual funds within two business days after you receive a simplified prospectus or Fund Facts document, or
- cancel your purchase within 48 hours after you receive confirmation of the purchase.

In some provinces and territories, you also have the right to cancel a purchase, or in some jurisdictions, claim damages, if the simplified prospectus, Fund Facts document or financial statements contain a misrepresentation. You must act within the time limit set by the securities law in your province or territory.
